FIRE & POLICE COMMITTEE – Tom Fisher – (Chair)

1. Base station and antenna installation in the radio room completed on February 24, 2020.
2. Siren weather warning to be reprogrammed to extend time period. *Kevin from Centre communication has been notified to make the change.*
3. Gerry Perry and Brad Flick to document procedures for base station usage and accessibility.
4. 2019 school contract will end in March and the new contract will begin. The school has been awarded \$30,000 grant for continuation of SRO program. *The contract amount was at \$25,000 for the prior year.*
5. Police have ordered badges with new design.

ELECTRIC & EQUIP. COMMITTEE - Mike Lottig – (Chair) Tom G. Read

Generator Update – The generators report unavailable at this time.

1. PowerSecure received warnings relating to DEF fluid levels on February 25th and was on site to reset alarms and check system. PowerSecure confirmed Berlin Oil drained tanks, without authorization from PowerSecure. PowerSecure is investigating cost and breakdown in communication as PowerSecure only requested a quote.
2. AMP - AFEC Unit 1 electrical generator forced outage on January 1 for required repairs and is scheduled to be operable this month.
3. AMP representative to present updated proposed for meter system and replacement.
4. Main Street will require an electric outage (5-7 hrs.) in preparation of revitalization project. To be scheduled in the next couple weeks weather permitting.
5. Berlin School is moving forward with quotes for new door, signage, and interior louvers for the transformer room. The addition of cameras and smoke alarms were discussed with the school on 3/3.
6. Transformer inspection requires scheduled outage with the school, and independent inspection should be performed for the borough regarding the transformer replacement. The borough should request certificate of insurance from the school and release of liability.
7. Release agreement for removal of tree at 806 Main St. due to change in electric line location.
8. Release agreement required from property owner-810 Main St. to replace pole near sidewalk.
9. Camera transfer cost reduced to \$425 originally council approved \$1,000 on 02/20/20.

HOUSE COMMITTEE – Stephen Custer – (Chair)

1. Comcast installation scheduled for Borough Building and Police Office March 10th.
2. Dan Saylor will be on site to verify phone system operation.
3. Flagpole installation is marked and to be installed weather permitting.
4. Costars contract for 2019 Salt was 110 ton and 92.7 tons were received, balance of contract is not required, the 2020 contract for salt is set for 110 ton.

5. Electronic recycling – last year residents requested date for spring and fall confirm with JVS proposed dates of May 16th and October 24th. *Both dates were approved.*

STREETS, STORM SEWERS & SIDEWALK – Thomas Jones – (Chair)

Committee meeting on March 2nd, John Harding, Cliff Horner, Tom Jones, Tom G. and Chadd Sines from AEG.

1. Cumberland Street Update

- a. Darr Construction to finish landscaping work along sidewalk weather permitting.

2. East Main St – Columbia Gas project– Phase II –

- a. MandB Construction has communicated a proposed start date of late March weather permitting.
- b. Columbia Gas agreement for sidewalk – the borough received payment in the amount of \$73,999.04.

3. East Main St – Columbia Gas project – Phase I -12th Ave to Cassel. *Tom Jones handout of the drawing provided by AEG regarding the corrected entrance at the school.*

- a. Based on input from PennDOT at our February 7th meeting in Hollidaysburg the committee recommends changing the 11th avenue entrance to the school. This will eliminate potential delays from PennDOT and added cost savings for the borough. By moving the crosswalk back to the street this will not affect the Dratter property. Meeting on March 3rd with Dr. Reeder and presenting the changes were favorable, if approved by council it can be presented to the school board for approval.
- b. Agreement for the school easement for electricity and sidewalk required. *The school property will have lights moved back on school property. The comment was made that the sidewalk would continue back to the wall near Cassell St. And Tom Jones stated the Steps to the school could be replaced. It was questioned at the school board meeting.*
- c. AEG is working on finalizing the application and expects to submit to PennDOT early next week.
- d. AEG suggests bidding this project before permit is received.
- e. Steve Dratter – must be contacted regarding the proposed changes.
- f. Permit received to replace 9 waterlines – borough can begin replacement.

4. Diamond street project — CDBG funds project.

- a. AEG presented initial drawings and plans to committee on March 2nd, review of the width of street and discussion regarding the lack of space for bike lanes. Based on street width 23 ft – there should be no street parking. Currently only 1 sign across from Clarke’s designates no street parking.
- b. Scoping meeting with PennDOT addressed parking issues and access at multiple locations along the street.
- c. Plan is for this project to be completed for it to be bid prior to or in concurrence with the Main St. project.
- d. Redevelopment authority is working on clearances up to 30 days to complete.
- e. The 911 bike trail is currently projected to continue through Diamond Street.
- f. Resident raised the possibility that raised aggregate be used for sidewalk.

5. Main Street Revitalization.

- a. The project is 85% complete and project has been submitted for QA/QC review and for Constructability Review proposed dates have been requested for bidding.
- b. Decorative Holophane light pole – select from 5 samples Salem, Burlington, Oslow, Plymouth, and Chesapeake presented to council for review and approval.
- c. Lights from American Gas have now been approved to be supplied by the borough.
- d. 1 of the 6 electric poles still to be replaced at upper diamond for the project.
- e. Proposed submittal includes bike lanes on both sides from lower to upper diamond.

- f. The antique light in front of the Lutheran Church to be considered within the project.
 - g. Sidewalk thickness in front of the Church and Luther House is 6” thick curb is 2-3” high and slope is to the street, AEG to determine if any sidewalk can be preserved.
 - h. Historical society has voiced concerns regarding sidewalk construction near Vine.
6. **Columbia Gas project Phase III** – Cumberland street to 10th avenue.
 - a. Columbia Gas application is under review at PennDOT.
 - b. Current plan is to put back as is, without curb or raising of Sidewalks.
 7. **Dale Werner Variance request** – New plans submitted requesting 10 ft. from Powell’s property line requests variance to the street, Solicitor presented to Powell’s attorney, negative response from Powell’s.
 8. **Sediment removal** – Clear sediment ditch to prevent backup on shady lane.

The 911 trail was discussed and the changes that were proposed as it was to go up station hill which is steep. Tom Fisher said that parking on that street is also an issue as it is narrow streets. Tom Jones presented the topic of a light at the lower diamond, now that the trail is going that way. The council agreed that would not be a good idea and a topic not for the project. Tom Fisher brought up that the Rails to Trails was to be based on High Street. And we should continue with the project. Columbia Gas is working on permitting from Cumberland St to 10th avenue and Tom Fisher asked if the borough had committed any money into this project. Which Tom G answered not at this time and Tom Jones said maybe we should once we see Columbia Gas issues. The current plan for Main St revitalization was to review a pole that was similar to those used in the west main ‘St project. The Plymouth was selected as the pole – fluted. What is the cost? Hold Tom G explained the cost was in the 1.2 and Steve Spochart should look at this topic. The Concrete in front of the Luther church and Luther house is 6” thick and they want to maintain that thickness. The historical society is concerned about the sidewalk at pius springs and doesn’t want it touched. Tom Fisher said he would talk to Suder.

Motion by Steve Custer and seconded by Tom Fisher to approve the drawings along the school bike lanes on north and south side of Main St. between upper and lower diamonds.
